

Louis Nordell gave a presentation on constructing a Longworth Chuck using his CNC router. The Longworth Chuck provides a very efficient way for finishing the bottoms of bowls turned on lathes. The design was developed in the late 1980's in Australia by Leslie Longworth. A key feature is a reliable means to center the piece on the chuck.

Lindsey Smith


